Mission:

At AHCC, our faith urges us to serve our neighbors in our Asylum Hill community and beyond to create a better world for all of us. We build personal relationships within our congregation and with our neighbors to better understand each other's lives and how we can help each of us succeed. There are many ways to serve, from volunteering at our weekly community meals, to advocating for social justice, to promoting actions to preserve our environment. The groups currently working in our Justice and Outreach Ministry Team are:

At AHCC's weekly <u>Community Meals</u> we both serve and visit with our neighbors from across the city. We purchase food and supplies from local small businesses and nonprofits, and often provide space for agencies to offer additional benefits such as blood pressure screenings, children's activities, or agencies' staff to help access other social services.
